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Initiative Petition Filed to End Gerrymandering in Oklahoma

If passed, the measure would stop the decades old practice of politicians drawing their own voting districts to guarantee reelection.

OKLAHOMA CITY — People Not Politicians, a coalition of concerned Oklahomans who want to end gerrymandering by taking power away from politicians and bringing it back to the people, filed an initiative petition today. The petition aims to establish an independent and transparent process for determining the state's legislative and congressional voting districts. The measure would replace current law that allows politicians and special interests to manipulate voting districts to guarantee their reelection and strike a blow to partisan gerrymandering — a little trick politicians use to keep themselves in office.

"This proposal will prevent self-serving politicians from manipulating the system and force them to listen to the people they represent instead of pandering to special interests and their party's extremes," said Andy Moore, founder and executive director of Let's Fix This, a grassroots organization to get regular, everyday people involved in politics. "Oklahoma's politicians have failed us. The state has real problems that the politicians have done nothing to fix. Our roads and bridges are crumbling, our hospitals are closing, our teachers are leaving, and our schools are falling behind. This proposal is an important step to hold politicians accountable so they actually start focusing on solving our important problems."

Current Oklahoma law allows members of the state Legislature to re-draw their own districts behind closed doors, and without any oversight or input from the public. Essentially, this allows Oklahoma politicians to hand-pick their own voters.

If passed by Oklahoma voters, the ballot measure would create an independent, neutral and citizen-led redistricting commision to ensure our district lines are drawn in the best interest of the people, not politicians. All work by the commission would be conducted in the open, in full-view

of the public.

"By making politicians more accountable to voters, this proposal will force them to actually start focusing on finding solutions to the problems facing Oklahoma, like our struggling schools, our crumbling roads and closing hospitals," said Jan Largent, president of the League of Women Voters of Oklahoma. "Oklahomans deserve to have fair and equal representation across the state, and partisan gerrymandering is keeping that from happening. This initiative will create more competitive elections, which will force politicians to be responsive to the needs of average citizens and start fixing many of the state's real problems."
